<u>A Guide to Spring Term Assessments Scores (based on national standards 2023, subject to change</u> <u>year-on-year</u>)

Below you will see the threshold for scores to achieve the expected standard (EXS) or greater depth (GDS) standard in each of the core subjects. Scores below the EXS threshold can be interpreted as working towards the expected standard. The reading and SPAG assessment is based on expected scores by the end of the school year, so if the score does not yet meet the threshold for EXS but is close to it, this is a good indication that the child will be on track to reach the expected standard for their year group by July. For maths, the assessment is based on the expected standard for where they are at this stage in the year. If you have any questions about this, please talk to your child's class teacher.
