with evidence. **Spoken Word:** Articulate and justify answers, arguments and opinions.


Text and Word: Use paragraphs to organise ideas around a theme.

Sentence structure: Fronted adverbials (see above).

<u>Maths</u>

- Recall and use multiplication and division facts for multiplication tables up to 12 × 12.
- Use place value, known and derived facts to multiply and divide mentally, including: multiplying by 0 and 1;
- dividing by 1; multiplying together three numbers.
- Recognise and use factor pairs and commutativity in mental
- calculations.
- Multiply two digit and three digit numbers by a one digit number using formal written layout.
- Solve problems involving multiplying and adding, including using the distributive law to multiply two digit
- numbers by one digit, integer scaling problems and harder
- correspondence problems such as n objects are connected to m objects.
- Find the area of rectilinear shapes by counting squares.



The children will be learning about the miracles that Jesus performed and what we can learn from them. They will compare and identify similarities and differences about miracles from other faiths.

THEM E

Theme name: The Tudors in London Subject Driver: History

In this theme, in Science children will be studying magnets and how they attract or repel some materials but not others. We will describe magnets as having two poles and investigate how a magnet's attraction changes depending on its pole. In **Geography** we will be locating places in the British Isles mentioned in our class text. In **History**, the children will be learning about everyday life in Tudor London, about the monarchs of the House of Tudor with a special study on Henry VIII. In ICT children will be using digital cameras and editing final products. In DT, children will be making a Tudor purse. In Music, children will be listening to instruments and identifying different sections of an orchestra and rehearsing for the singing festival at The Globe Theatre. In PHSE, we will be working collaboratively towards shared goals.
