Liturgy

Children will learn about prayer, psalms, silence, music, ritual, symbols, sacraments, the structure of liturgy, the purpose, place and different styles of worship.

THEME

Theme name: Crime and Punishment

Subject Driver: Science

In this theme, in **Science**, children will be learning that some materials dissolve in a liquid to form a solution as well as describing how to recover a substance from the solution. They will also be looking at ways in which we can group materials depending upon their properties. They will begin to develop and use their own sketchbook in Art by completing work from a variety of sources. In Music they will be listening and responding to a variety of different music from a range of genres and in **History** they will be researching highwaymen, including Dick Turpin, whilst learning to question the validity of different sources they encounter. They will look at how crime and punishment has been tackled throughout British history from the Tudors to the present day. In **PHSE**, they will be looking at what it means to be in a community and groups and individuals that support the local community. Suggested visits to support learning: the Tower of London, find the local village lock-ups at Cranford and Petersham.
