#### PE and Sports Premium Funding - Planned Spending and Combined Year 6 Swimming and Impact of Spend Report

PE and Sports Premium Funding was introduced in 2013. It was provided directly to primary schools across the country who can use it however they want, to provide PE and sporting activities for pupils.

The premium must be used to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils, in the 2020-21 academic year, to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles. Ofsted will assess and report on how effectively this is being used when schools are inspected. Schools are required to report on expenditure, including the following details:

- the PE and sport premium allocation for the current financial year
- details of how a school intends to spend their allocation
- how it made a difference to the PE and sport participation and attainment of the pupils who attract the funding.

In addition, schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of Physical Education, Sport and Physical Activity (PESPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and Sport Premium to:

- Develop or add to the PESPA activities that our school already offers
- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

At Bishop Perrin, we have adopted the Youth Sport Trust's PE Premium reporting template which has been designed in consultation with the Department for Education (DfE). This document identifies 5 key indicators across the school that we are looking to develop and improve upon and as such, our PE Premium funding will be allocated to support these objectives.

The Headteacher at Bishop Perrin is the Richmond Borough Primary Schools' representative for the Youth Sport Trust's London Headteacher Alliance. He chairs and organises the Richmond Primary Schools' Annual Borough Sports at St Mary's University, Twickenham.




